Qazizoda Rumi was active at Ulughbek's observatory and authored *Sharh al-Mulakhkhas*. He was a scholar who made important contributions to the development of trigonometry and astronomy.

Ghiyath al-Din Jamshid Kashi attained a very high level of precision in mathematical calculations and, in his work *Miftah al-Hisab*, calculated the value of  $\pi$  (pi) with remarkable accuracy.

Ali Qushchi, a student of Mirzo Ulughbek, developed significant theories concerning the motion of celestial bodies in his treatise *Risala dar Hay'at*.



Alisher Navoi (1441–1501), the founder of Turkic literature, produced major literary works in the Turkic language, including *Khamsa* (five epics), *Lisan ut-Tayr*, and *Mahbub ul-Qulub*.

Abdurahman Jami, a prominent representative of Persian literature, explored Sufi and ethical themes in his works *Baharestan* and *Haft Awrang*.

Zahiriddin Muhammad Babur, in his work *Baburnama*, provided detailed information on geography, nature, and history, while continuing the Timurid intellectual legacy.

Kamoliddin Behzod, a leading master of Eastern miniature painting and founder of the Herat school, introduced elements of realism and psychological depth into art through his illustrations of *Layli and Majnun* and miniatures of the *Shahnama*.

Abdulqadir Maraghi, one of the founders of Eastern musicology, provided a scientific foundation for the maqam system in his works *Jami al-Alhan* and *Maqasid al-Alhan*.

During the Timurid period, architecture reached a high level of development, and Samarkand and Herat emerged as major cultural centers. Prominent monuments included the Gur-e-Amir Mausoleum, the Bibi-Khanym Mosque, and Registan Square, along with the development of blue domes, intricate ornamentation, and geometric decoration.

Under Amir Timur and the Timurids, science (astronomy and mathematics) attained a global level, literature (Navoi and Jami) reached outstanding heights, and art (Kamoliddin Behzod) advanced to a new stage. Music theory took shape, and architecture became part of world heritage. For this reason, this period is referred to as the Second Renaissance, as it made a significant contribution not only to Central Asia but also to world civilization.
